Tools of the Trade: Proper Setup

NTRODUCTION

This episode prepares future graders for the necessities of a coin grading environment. Specific focus is placed on magnification, lighting, and handling.

Magnification

- Don and Jim both use the Bausch and Lomb Hastings Triplet loupe. The three lenses makes it more dependable
- Three different magnifications are recommended, all based on your needs:
 - \rightarrow 7x for examining a coin in general
 - \rightarrow 10x for zooming in on a certain area
 - \rightarrow 20x for looking at a mint mark or fine detail
- When using a loupe, do not put the magnifier to your eye
 - \rightarrow Find a comfortable distance between the magnifier and the coin, moving the coin to focus

Lighting

- Swing arm lamps are popular and easy to use
- Halogen or incandescent bulbs are recommended
 - \rightarrow Avoid fluorescent or LED lighting
- Use a 75-100 watt bulb
- Make sure you only have one source of light
 - \rightarrow Avoid overhead or window light

Handling


- When handling a coin, be careful not to drop it
 - \rightarrow Protect your coins by holding them over a soft surface like a velvet pad or jewelry tray
- Handle the coin by the edges
- Look at the coin with the naked eye before magnification. Trust your first impressions.
- When making first impressions, consider the following:
 - \rightarrow Is it circulated or uncirculated?
 - \rightarrow Is it mint state or proof?
 - \rightarrow Are there problems?
- Rotate the coin in the light and at various angles
- Look at all three sides of the coin
