

COVID-19 PROTOCOL 2023

What happens if you attend Summer Seminar and contract COVID-19? If you are in an apartment or a double room, you and your roommates will be required to isolate for five days. If you are in a single room in a dorm, you will also have to isolate but others in the dorm will not have to isolate. During those five days, it will be your responsibility to arrange food and medication delivery. Staff will not be able to deliver food from the cafeteria or stores. If your stay goes beyond what has already been paid for, you will be responsible for the additional nightly lodging rate. The ANA will issue a prorated tuition refund based on the number of class days missed due to isolation. 1. Grading United States Coins, Pt. 1 Explore the history and philosophy of grading, and learn how to grade copper, silver and gold U.S. coins according to the latest ANA and market standards. Instruction will consist of slide presentations, hands-on opportunities to view and grade notable specimens in individual and group settings, and in-depth discussions about the intricacies of grading. Enrollment is limited to 20 students.

Detection Learn how counterfeits are made from ancient times to today. Chinese counterfeits that have entered the coin market over the last 30 years are emphasized. This plague is not because of the sophistication of counterfeits, but because of the sheer number in the market. Examine Chinese counterfeits and see how easily you can spot them. If you work in law enforcement you'll gain the confidence to go to court and prove your case. If you're buying coins online or through the mail, or work at a coin shop, pawn shop, or as a vest pocket dealer, you will benefit from this class.

4. Introduction to Paper Money Grading FULL

Discover the basics of paper money authentication and grading, including proper lighting, printing techniques, counterfeit and forgery detection, and an explanation of grading standards in current use by collectors and dealers in the marketplace. Students examine examples of bank notes in various grades and test their skills throughout the session. Learn to identify doctored or pressed notes, detect repairs or restorations, and determine if a note has original paper surfaces.

5. Creating a Winning Numismatic Exhibit


One of the most rewarding aspects of coin collecting is sharing knowledge with others through an exhibit. Students go through the entire process, from brainstorming, to writing and selecting materials, to designing a balanced layout and pulling it all together. Learn how to pack an exhibit for transportation and become familiar with exhibit rules and judging. Participants are encouraged to improve an already existing display or create a new one before attending. Bringing along a laptop computer and ideas for new exhibits is also recommended.

Participants get advice regarding collecting themes, grading, authentication, and the international marketplace for

ancient coinage. Students are encouraged to bring coins from their own collections.

Learn how to use multiple lighting configurations and get the most out of your equipment for comparison tests. Discover proper image capture and file handling methods for efficiency. Learn basic numismatic editing techniques using Adobe Photoshop and Photoshop Elements to produce ideal images and manage them well. Students are encouraged to bring a DSLR camera with a macro lens, a laptop with Photoshop or Photoshop Elements, and several personal numismatic items to photograph.

8. The Medal in America

Explore medals from the period of exploration of the New World to present day. Students examine medals authorized by Congress, U.S. Mint medals, Indian Peace medals, military medals, agricultural and school medals, and more. The evolution of the art medal from the 20th century to today is examined.

9. Modern World Coins & Bank Notes, A Survey from 1901 to Date This class provides a survey of modern world numismatics. Sessions cover the pre-WWII classics, 1901-1945; Colonial independence and rise of base metals, 1946-1970; the rise of non-circulating legal tender (NCLT) and products of the Franklin Mint, Pobjoy Mint and other world mints, and the popularization of circulating commemoratives, 1971-2000; and Euros, the continuation of NCLT, and the advent of Polymer banknotes, 2001 to date.

10. Collecting Roman Coinage Pt. 1: Imperatorial to Valerian I

Discover the first three centuries of Roman Imperatorial and Imperial coinage. Use digital images, handouts, reference books and coins to learn about denominations, mints, legends, portraiture, reverse types and coins as propaganda. Collector-oriented topics include themes, grading, authentication, and the international marketplace for ancient coinage and how to participate. Students are encouraged to bring coins from their own collections. A basic knowledge of Roman history is helpful.

Extant populations, grading and grading services, wholesale and retail pricing, supply and demand, and critical resources are covered. Find out how to grade, identify rare die varieties and errors, and how best to buy, sell, or trade Morgan dollars. Whether you are a beginner or a seasoned Morgan collector, gain knowledge on collecting and investing from two well-respected experts on this popular series in numismatics.

12. Coins of the Byzantine Empire

Coins of the Byzantine Empire uniquely illustrate the Empire's military, political and cultural history. Trace the development of Byzantine coinage from its origins in the collapse of the Western Roman Empire to the Byzantine Empire's own collapse 1,000 years later. Encounter fascinating military, political and religious figures – in some cases a single person performing all three roles simultaneously – all witnesses to thrilling historical events from a turbulent time.

13. Business of Being a Coin Dealer

Get into the coin business, sharpen your skills and learn new ways to increase the profit potential of your current operation. Learn how to market and promote your business using social media, internet, search engines, and the value of networking with wholesale traders online and on the road. Some study is required. Class size is limited so early registration is suggested.

14. Advanced Study of World Coinage Take an in-depth look at attribution, authentication, and determining the method of manufacture for a large number of world issues. Examine the sometimes-subtle difference between proof of mint state, what makes a coin a specimen, and how to tell restrikes from originals for several coinage types. The class will also dive into the logic behind authentication and "numismatic forensics" such as die matching, repeating depressions/marks, etc., which are crucial for the practical application of authentication across all coinage.

Sunday-Monday, June 18-19, 6:30PM-9:30PM FULL

This seminar covers the basics of digital image editing for collectors, dealers, and researchers. Learn how to organize and edit coin and paper money images for print and web publishing, personal reference, and exhibiting. Topics include software options and Photoshop basics, as well as best practices for file organization, formatting, image resolution, and ethical guidelines. Demonstrations include basic color correction, adding and removing backgrounds, and creating drop shadows and reflections. Gain hand-on experience combining separate obverse and reverse photos into a single seamless composite image. Students are recommended to bring their own digital images, but practice images will be provided by the instructor.

On Campus LIVING

These are basic dorm rooms with SHARED BATH-ROOMS AND NO AIR-CONDITIONING. though each double and private room has window fans on a first-come-first-served basis. (They will need to be requested at Loomis Hall between the hours of 8 a.m. and 10 p.m. daily.) The beds are standard twinsize with clean linens provided on arrival, including sheets and towels. (If you want fitted sheets, you may choose to bring your own.) No cleaning service is available during your stay, though you can request fresh towels and linens. (They will need to be reguested at Loomis Hall between the hours of 8 a.m. and 10 p.m. daily.) If you plan to stay on campus, you will need to bring your own toiletries. Should you forget something, two 7-Eleven stores are within walking distance of campus, and the college bookstore offers a limited selection of basic supplies.

You can choose between a double room (shared with one other student) and a single room, which is private. Neither has a bathroom in the room, but they do have small refrigerators and microwaves. An apartment-style option offers four single rooms with one shared bathroom, a small kitchen, and a common space. If stairs are difficult for you, it is important that you indicate on your registration form that you require a room on the ground floor. If you register online, please contact Sheila Fortenberry at **719-482-9848** as soon as you register to advise her to make notes. If you do not contact staff or advise us on your registration form, you will not be guaranteed ground floor accommodations.

The ANA Summer Seminar is held annually on the Colorado College campus and utilizes its dormitories to house students.

You can also request specific roommates, so you can surround yourself with familiar faces all week! You can request a roommate on your registration form or by calling Sheila after you register online. Another benefit of staying on campus is that you are close to your classes, events, meals, and the Lunar Lounge, where adults gather at the end of the day. Please note that Colorado College is a college-setting dorm and dining atmosphere—there are no televisions, no air-conditioning, no seating areas in dorms, and only shared bathrooms. Students say that staying on campus is perfect for meeting new friends; however, if your health does not allow you to comfortably stay on campus, please look into other lodging options.

While many enjoy the campus experience, some students prefer to stay at a hotel. Several accommodations are nearby, about a mile from Colorado College, and the City of Colorado Springs offers a free shuttle service throughout downtown that drops off at Colorado College. 19th Century Counterfeit National Bank Notes INTERSESSION TALK | THURSDAY | JUNE 22

Original series nationals were widely counterfeited by skilled engravers, some of whom had worked for the major security printing firms that formerly had the contracts for production of US notes before the BEP pulled all printing back in-house. Counterfeits were actively reported in periodicals dedicated to informing merchants of new boodle entering the market. As fast as a note was reported, the fakers modified the plates to show a different bank's name and kept right on printing. This lecture will show several successions of such behavior. Learning to spot a diagnostic in a plate that was used for as many as six banks could save you a lot of headaches.

Counting-Tokens & The Commercial Revolution Intersession TALK | FRIDAY | JUNE 23

Prior to the adoption of Hindu-Arabic numerals as we know them today, the "casting-counter" or jeton played a practical role in every day computation related to what we call Roman numerals. These minted coin-like jetons used counting-boards and methods of linear calculation descended from ancient forms of the abacus. During the European Commercial Revolution of the 11th – 14th centuries, several factors in the growing population provided an on-going need for such everyday practical mathematical tools. The widespread use and adoption of these counting-tokens facilitated the emerging trade, expanding markets, growing productivity, and the new cash economy, taxation, money rents and early banking of this period. Jetons continued to be made and used into the 17th century, though by that time, they would be as "retro" as an adding machine might be today. Jetons would continue in use as political tokens, gaming chips, and play money, in many cases by the very same firms that issued counting-tokens hundreds of years earlier. There are many types and references for collecting and studying these interesting historical numismatic items.

23. Advanced United States Coin Grading & Problem Coins

Learn how to distinguish original surfaces from mint-state and circulated coins that have been cleaned or altered, and how to identify minute imperfections and color variances that can affect a coin's grade. Find out the methods used by experts, as well as their own strengths and weaknesses. Successful completion of "Grading United States Coins, Parts 1 and 2" or instructor permission are course prerequisites. Enrollment is limited to 24 students.


25. Early American Copper Coinage

27. Evolution of Western Coinage through Economics & Iconography Part 1

Trace the evolution of coinage throughout history from both an economic and iconographic perspective. The instructors complement each other by illustrating the same time period each day from these two disciplines' viewpoints. This first part covers ancient Greece through the time of Christopher Columbus, and Greg Thompson follows the course of human economic development from barter through the modern credit economy. Allen Berman traces coinage as a means of communication through art trends over the centuries.

During hard times, the paper usually reflects the circumstances of the era. This class covers 600+ years of paper money, including how it is made, what it represents, its artistry, and where it is going from here (soon it may not be "paper" money any longer). Spend hours handling notes, not simply watching slide shows. Pick the countries or periods you are interested in and enjoy.



Your collection will only become more treasured to you as you learn more about the pieces that it contains.

31. Coinage of the Roman Civil Wars (88-30 BC)

FULL In the 1st century B.C., the emergence of imperators permanently changed the political and monetary organization of the Roman Republic. Campaigns caused Roman armies to travel the Mediterranean and created the necessity for "moving mints." Territories ruled by the Roman Republic suffered from a series of civil wars that soon altered the dynamics of the empire. To analyze this complex scenario, an approach built on "connected histories" is required. Learn about coins issued by and for imperators such as Sulla and Marius, as well as coinages issued in Rome and in the Mediterranean in the course of the First and Second Triumvirate.


