The United States dollar coin

has been minted since 1794. The word "dollar" comes from the German word, "thaler." Most often the symbolic figure of Lady Liberty has appeared on dollar coins. It is important to note that there was a period from 1805 to 1835, when the U.S. Mint did not strike dollar coins.

Though dollar coins have not always been popular because of their weight and size, the U.S. Mint has worked to make dollar coins easily accepted by the public. These coins have been made in different sizes, colors, and metals to circulate and to commemorate a historic event. These coins have been made to circulate and to commemorate a historic event. Real people have also been featured on dollar coins. President Dwight D. Eisenhower, Susan B. Anthony, Sacagawea, and many others have become part of this rich history.

2. Commemorative Dollar


Coin you will earn: Susan B. Anthony, Presidential, or Sacagawea Dollar
